Good morning, everyone. This is the time 6 and place for the State Public Works Board meeting. It 7 is Wednesday, April 12th, and it is 9:00 a.m. Welcome. 8 The first item on our agenda is roll call. ADMINISTRATOR LEFEVRE: Kent Lefevre, for the 9 10 record. I'll take the roll. Chairperson Adam Hand? 11 CHAIRPERSON HAND: Present. ADMINISTRATOR LEFEVRE: Vice-Chair Clint 12 13 Bentley? 14 VICE-CHAIR BENTLEY: Present. 15 ADMINISTRATOR LEFEVRE: Member Tito Tiberti? 16 Member Kevin Lewis? Member Phillip Mannelly? 17 18 MEMBER MANNELLY: Present. 19 ADMINISTRATOR LEFEVRE: And Member and Director of Department of Administration, Jack Robb? 20 21 DIRECTOR ROBB: Here. 22 ADMINISTRATOR LEFEVRE: Let the record 23 reflect we have a quorum. 24 CHAIRPERSON HAND: Chairperson Hand, for the 25 record. Thank you. CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

The next item on our agenda for possible 1 action is acceptance and approval of the public -- Did I 2 go right past public comment? Do we have any public 3 comment this morning? It appears that there's no public 4 5 Thank you for getting me back on track here: comment. 6 The third item on our agenda this morning for 7 possible action is acceptance and approval of the State 8 Public Works Board's meeting minutes from December 9th, 2022 and January 4th, 2023. Do we have any revisions 9 10 that need to be made? 11 ADMINISTRATOR LEFEVRE: We do have a list of 12 revisions on the handout? VICE-CHAIR BENTLEY: I don't have any 13 revisions. I'd make a motion that we accept and approve 14 the Public Works Board meetings for December 9th, '22, 15 16 January 4th, '23 as recommended with the following 17 changes: One through 13. 18 DIRECTOR ROBB: Second. 19 CHAIRPERSON HAND: No other comments? All in favor? 20 21 THE BOARD: Aye. 22 CHAIRPERSON HAND: Opposed? And any abstaining? Okay. It looks like the motion passes and 23 24 the minutes have been approved. 25 And that will take us to Item 4 on the CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1 agenda, which is for discussion only, and this is the introduction of the new board member Phillip Mannelly, 2 and Jack Robb, the Director of the Department of 3 Administration. 4 DIRECTOR ROBB: Do you want to state anything 5 6 now? Maybe we can have our ADMINISTRATOR LEFEVRE: 7 8 new members just introduce themselves. 9 MEMBER MANNELLY: Good morning, everyone. 10 For the record, my name is Phillip Mannelly, and I'm an 11 attorney at McDonald Carano law firm based out of Reno in our Reno office. As I stated in the last meeting, really 12 excited to be a part of this board and thankful for the 13 appointment from Governor Sisolack and look forward to 14 working with the rest of the members including the new 15 16 administrator, Mr. Robb, and look forward to serving the State and hopefully adding value to this board. 17 18 COUNSEL STEWART: Welcome. 19 CHAIRPERSON HAND: Welcome. 20 MEMBER MANNELLY: Thank you. 21 ADMINISTRATOR ROBB: Thank you. My name is 22 Jack Robb. I'm the new director of the Department of Administration. Prior to that, I was at Nevada 23 24 Department of Wildlife for eight years, and prior to that, I owned Pacific Meter Services which I did utility 25 CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1 automation. I'm an A general contractor in five western states and traveled the West Coast for years. 2 Prior to that, I was at Sierra Pacific Power 3 Company and Truckee Meadows Water Authority working 4 5 through new business construction and water resources. So that's -- I can't figure out what I want to be in 6 life, so I keep changing. 7 Welcome, Director. 8 COUNSEL STEWART: CHAIRPERSON HAND: Yes. Welcome and thank 9 10 you both for the introductions. 11 COUNSEL STEWART: Chair, if I may, for the record, could we make a point of order that Member Tito 12 Tiberti has arrived. Good morning, Tito. 13 14 MEMBER TIBERTI: Good morning. Too many red lights. 15 16 CHAIRPERSON HAND: Thank you, Susan. Good morning, Tito. 17 18 The next item on our agenda for discussion is 19 the 2023 Legislative Session update, and it looks like we've got the CIP bills and then other relevant bills. 20 21 ADMINISTRATOR LEFEVRE: I'll take that one. Kent Lefevre, for the record. We have -- I'll give you a 22 brief update on the CIP first. Since the last time we've 23 24 met, the Public Works has presented all of the gov rec projects to the Legislature in three different sessions. 25 CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1 Our last one was just last week.

2	And the Governor's Office has issued a CIP
3	amendment last week which shifted some of the CIP items
4	to a new vision. If approved, the State will be
5	acquiring 14 new buildings at the McCarran Center south
6	of the airport in Las Vegas for a new seat of state
7	government in Southern Nevada. So that's the update on
8	the CIP.
9	We've continued to respond to questions from
10	legislative staff, and we're anticipating a work session
11	on the 18th which is next Tuesday, and then we have our
12	budget closings next Friday a week from the Friday.
13	So as far as the CIP bills go, we've had
14	three bills that were presented to the legislature. One
15	was SB 52, which added the consideration of net zero to
16	the standards for State Public Works. That item was
17	withdrawn, but we still have two bills going forward: SB
18	25, which implements a program for long-term planning for
19	state office space, and SB 26, which raises the dollar
20	threshold on State Public Works contract change order
21	limits, and both of those were passed by the Government
22	Affairs Committee last week and they're moving to the
23	house the floor, right? They're moving to the floor.
24	I'm not sure what the timing is on that. And then
25	Susan's got an update on other relevant bills. CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

COUNSEL STEWART: Susan Stewart, for the 1 Very briefly, because we of course we really 2 record. just don't know where any of this is going or where it's 3 going to land or what it's going to look like, there are 4 5 right now four bills that expand application of prevailing wage in pretty significant ways. 6 They're making their way through their original committees. 7

There is a deadline this Friday for passage 8 out of the original committee unless exempt, so we'll 9 10 have a good idea of how many of these are going to die a 11 natural death. There's also two bills that make changes 12 to the apprenticeship requirements on Public Works projects. Again, there's an original bill, there's 13 mock-up amendments on these, and so again, where they're 14 going to land is unclear. 15

16 There's also another bill that changes how contractors have to list one percent subcontractors and 17 18 five percent subcontractors. Again, unclear where that's 19 going to go. We're tracking all of that. Grateful that 20 there's nothing policy wise that is going to be a 21 problem. You know, it will mean revising some of our procedures. We may have to change some of our contract 22 documents, but there's no, you know, earth-shattering 23 bills out there that impact on Public Works program. 24 And I don't know if there's any questions. 25 CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

CHAIRPERSON HAND: Thank you, Susan. 1 Does anybody have any questions for Susan on the bills or 2 Kent? 3 COUNSEL STEWART: And for the record, could 4 5 we reflect that Member Lewis has joined us via Teams. Good morning, Member Lewis. 6 MEMBER LEWIS: Good morning. 7 AG WOODRUM: Just for information for board 8 members, it's always a good reminder if you do want to --9 this is Homa Woodrum, for the record. 10 11 If you do want to participate in the 12 legislative process and want to give public comment, you want to make sure you're not trying to speak for the 13 Board or in relation to your position on any board. 14 Make sure you're speaking in your own professional and 15 16 personal capacity. But definitely, always encourage people to participate and, you know, in public comment or 17 18 those opportunities during session. 19 COUNSEL STEWART: Thank you, Homa. 20 CHAIRPERSON HAND: Thank you. That brings us 21 to Item Number 6 on our agenda, which is for discussion 22 only also, and it's Public Workshop, Executive Order 2023-003, regulation review. And I assume Susan is 23 24 taking this one, too. 25 COUNSEL STEWART: Good morning. Susan CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

Stewart, for the record. So as reflected in the agenda item, there is a Governor's Executive Order that was issued earlier this year requiring agencies conduct a regulation review. Part of the direction given was to hold a public meeting. So to facilitate the public meeting, we're holding a board meeting with the workshop as an agenda item. It's not an action item.

At the conclusion of this meeting, the State Public Works Division will prepare a report as required on the outcome of our review which will include the process that's happening here today. So just as an overview, what you have attached to your packet and I believe there are extra board packets there if anybody wants one, but I prepared a memo to discuss the process.

Attached to that is the Governor's Executive Order, the informational report which is additional information and guidance given by the Governor's Office. Exhibit C is a survey questions and results, which I'll talk about a little bit more, and then finally Exhibit D is the notice of workshop.

21 So right behind Agenda Item Number 6 is a 22 memo, and I'll just be walking through this briefly and 23 then we'll conclude with comment from those who took the 24 time to come today, and we certainly appreciate that. So 25 as I said, Executive Order 2023-003 requires all CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

executive branch agencies to conduct a review of our regulations. The order directed that the State Public Works Division provide a report to detail how our regs can be streamlined, clarified, reduced or otherwise improved to insure our regulations provide for the general welfare of the state without inhibiting economic growth.

8 Part of our report includes the name, 9 address, business, phone number and email address of 10 everyone who participated in the survey as well as who 11 participates here at the meeting, so please make sure 12 that you've signed in and you've signed in with all of 13 the required information.

So the Governor's Office, the guidance that I mentioned, which is attached as Exhibit B, says that we have to hold a public meeting and we're going to get input from stakeholders to vet our changes, changes that the Public Works Division recommended, and also to solicit input from other stakeholders.

20 So the first thing that the State Public 21 Works Division did was we prepared the survey. And I 22 think everyone here has seen the survey. It was emailed 23 to over 600 Public Works Division vendors, contractors, 24 consultants seeking their input on our regulations. 25 Participants had two weeks to respond. The survey was 26 CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1 also posted on our website and Exhibit C, you've got a
2 large copy, and there were large copies, I think, put at
3 the front for folks too that you could actually read it
4 if it's in a large version.

And you can see part of what we did was we crafted the questions in a way that they responded to the Governor's Executive Order. So that was the reason for the way we crafted the questions.

So the next step was on March 28th, we 9 10 provided notice of a workshop, and so there was a separate notice done and that's attached to the Exhibit 11 12 And the notice provided a summary of the survey D. results as well as SBWD staff recommendations for changes 13 14 to the reas. That workshop notice was also emailed to the 600 vendors, contractors, consultants. 15 It was sent 16 to LCB for posting there. It was also put on our website and then posted at both Public Works Division's offices 17 18 north and south.

So for the workshop, I'll briefly go over the survey results. Staff has made some recommendations. We'll cover those. As far as public stakeholder input, mentioned in the workshop was the opportunity to submit comments in writing. We didn't receive any written comments. And then we'll go to other stakeholder input, and that would be for those here that are personally in CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1 attendance.

2	So the survey questions and results. The
3	survey directions told participants to only comment on
4	regulations under the State Public Works Division
5	jurisdiction. Unfortunately, we did get several comments
6	on regs that were under the purview of the labor
7	commissioner that pertained only to NSHE. There was a
8	comment about NDOT's electronic system. So seven of the
9	responses did not pertain to Public Works Division regs.
10	We got four comments that said no changes were necessary.
11	We got four comments concerning construction manager at
12	risk, concerns that we should eliminate CMAR and
13	that's the acronym for construction manager at risk. We
14	should eliminate it, and the CMAR process should be open
15	to more general contractors.
16	There was a change in the timeframe for
17	subcontractors to appeal a decision of disqualification.
18	On our veteran's preference, there was a comment that it
10	

19 should be open to all disabilities, and then there was a 20 comment that NAC 33A and NAC 341 should be deleted in 21 their entirety as they're outdated and obsolete.

Then there were a few comments on administration, our billing platform, the bid form, and then also a comment that the consultant fee should be able to include inflation. So that is the brief summary CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

of the survey results. Everyone has those. There's been
 copies available there. And so unless there are
 questions, I can go into what staff recommended for
 changes. Seeing none, I'll keep going.

So when staff considered making their 5 6 recommendations, we took into consideration that Public Works is guided by NAC 341 and NAC 338. However, NAC 338 7 also implicates local government, it implicates other 8 state agencies that can do their own construction, for 9 10 example, Department of Wildlife, NDOT, and so for 11 purposes of staff recommendations, they just focused on NAC 341 which is the NAC that only applies to State 12 Public Works Division. 13

And so with that in mind, there was one 14 recommendation under the green building design regs to 15 16 delete the simple payback period as unnecessary and redundant and then other general provisions which were 17 18 all considered unnecessary and redundant which was the 19 contract documents, alternative bids, and the review of 20 proposals regarding local adoption of UPC. Those are 21 primarily administrative functions that are handled by contract. 22

The last recommendation which is probably the most substantive is NAC 341.136 which provides for the State Public Works Division to select consultants using a CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1 formal committee where the estimated price is \$250,000.
2 And staff considered that to be a fairly low threshold
3 for a formal solicitation process, and so the
4 recommendation was to increase the threshold to a million
5 dollars where there's more value added for larger
6 projects and a more formal procedure. So those were
7 staff's recommendations.

And if there are no questions, I will move to 8 the next part of the workshop which would be other 9 10 stakeholder input which would be the input from those 11 that are here attending the meeting, and I have Phillip. Susan, I do have a question 12 MEMBER MANNELLY: on the staff recommendations. Phil Mannelly. 13 14 On number one, the green building design regulations, NAC 3.41.341, simple payback period defined, 15

17 "simple payback period" is used in two other regulations: 18 341.351, Subsection 1C and 341.356 Subsection 2. So if 19 the definition of simple payback period is defined, how 20 would that potentially impact the interpretation of those 21 other regulations where that phrase is used?

when I looked at NAC 341, I noticed that that phrase

22 COUNSEL STEWART: Susan Stewart, for the
23 record. I believe the reason for deleting it was it's
24 covered in the NRS, so there is a requirement in the NRS
25 as how we analyze the application of the green building CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1 design regulations, and so that was why it was suggested for deletion. 2 3 MEMBER MANNELLY: Okay. MEMBER WOODRUM: And Homa Woodrum, for the 4 We're finding this with a lot of reviews of 5 record. 6 regulations that there's duplicative regs that redefine things that you can find elsewhere in statute so people 7 8 would know to look at the companion NRS to find it. So it's been a common issue that's come up. 9 10 ADMINISTRATOR LEFEVRE: Kent Lefevre, for the 11 record. One other thing that we learned in this exercise 12 is that the green standard is somewhat of a coined phrase from 20 years ago, and it might be more appropriately 13 14 defined as high-performance buildings rather than a green building. So we're looking at maybe changing that 15 16 around. MEMBER MANNELLY: Okay. I have one other. 17 18 Phil Mannelly. On NAC 341.1127, the proposals regarding 19 local adoption of Uniform Plumbing Code, can you maybe 20 explain how that's currently used and why that would be, 21 you know, what the impact of that is as well? COUNSEL STEWART: Yeah. 22 Susan Stewart, for the record. It is not being currently used. 23 24 MEMBER MANNELLY: Okay. Fair enough. Yeah, I reviewed the regulation, and I personally was not 25 CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1 familiar with it, so I was wondering what the current use 2 is. 3 COUNSEL STEWART: Yeah. Thank you. MEMBER MANNELLY: Good to know. 4 Thank you. COUNSEL STEWART: Any other questions on 5 6 staff recommendations? Okay. Susan Stewart, for the record. 7 So now is the time for additional stakeholder 8 And what I would ask is that you identify your 9 input. 10 name and spell your name for the court reporter. I would 11 also ask that if you have a general comment on the regulations as a whole that you please state that, and if 12 you have a specific regulation that you're concerned 13 14 about, that you would state that as well. For the court reporter's sake, I ask that 15 16 only one person speak at a time because she can only take down one person at a time. And I also brought my own 17 18 copies of NAC 341 and 338 if anybody wanted to look at 19 them or needed assistance with that and we'll pause. And if there's no preference, maybe we'll start in the south 20 21 and we'd just go around the table. And with the Chair's permission, I don't think this is a one shot that you 22 only get to speak one time. So certainly, if someone 23 24 brought something up that was relevant, you know, I think 25 it's meant to be a robust discussion and to get your CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1 input, so thank you.

2	Does anyone in the south want to start with
3	their comments on State Public Works Division regs?
4	MEMBER NALLEY: I'm here. This is Kirsten
5	Nalley, for the record. I don't think we have anybody
6	jumping in down here for any comments.
7	COUNSEL STEWART: All right. Thank you.
8	Well, then, with that, we'll shift to the north. Does
9	anybody in the north want to provide public comment on
10	State Public Works Division regulations?
11	MR. KEMNER: No, ma'am. Kevin Kemner:
12	K-E-M-N-E-R. TSK Architects, for the record. No, I have
13	no comment.
14	DIRECTOR ROBB: Jack Robb, for the record.
15	I've been in multiple of these now because all of the
16	agencies are doing it, and that means staff hit it down
17	the middle of the fairway because in other ones, staff
18	was in the rough on both sides and it brought both it
19	brought multiple people to the table.
20	Both processes work. Both are accepted. So
21	if there's no comment, I was hoping for some comments
22	today of what else we can improve upon. That's not just
23	our recommendations, but are there other things that we
24	can look at to improve upon. This is about
25	simplification not just for the agency, but for all CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1	stakeholders and a better way to get a better product to
2	the citizens of the State of Nevada to reduce costs.
3	MR. KEMNER: All right. Kevin Kemner:
4	K-E-M-N-E-R, TSK, for the record. I didn't see it in the
5	survey. I do think that if the State is looking at
6	opportunities to handle costs a little differently and to
7	improve delivery of services that a closer look and I
8	believe that there's a look at happening now, but a
9	closer look at how the funding cycle, hiring cycle,
10	design cycle is structured.
11	So the multi and part of this of course is
12	State of Nevada is a biennium. It's not an annual
13	system. But the biennium structure drags projects out
14	for a long time, and it creates inefficiencies that maybe
15	could be resolved better or get better delivery by
16	accelerating that delivery method somehow.
17	COUNSEL STEWART: Thank you. Anyone else?
18	Suggestions? You guys are awesome.
19	MEMBER NALLEY: Kirsten Nalley, for the
20	record. We do have a comment down here.
21	MR. COWLES: Hi. My name is Wayne Cowles.
22	I'm with Able Integrated Solutions. Forgive me if I'm
23	out of order here whatever, but I didn't get a chance to
24	provide an input on the survey, but I would like to
25	understand or comment on the 338.040, the Apprenticeship CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

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Utilization Act. It was put together by mandate and
 forced onto the market which essentially eliminated our
 ability to participate in Public Works projects because
 we are not a union shop. We don't participate in an
 approved apprenticeship program.

6 However, we have previously for the last 20 7 plus years successfully completed and participated in 8 State Public Works projects and don't really understand 9 -- well, from our perspective, it appears to be a push to 10 go a hundred percent union. And we pretty much believe 11 it to be or look at it to be unfair. We'd like to see it 12 eliminated.

13 COUNSEL STEWART: Susan Stewart, for the 14 record. I have no opinion on your comment other than to 15 say 338.040 is under the jurisdiction of the labor 16 commissioner, and I would encourage you to reach out to 17 her. I don't know if they've done their reg review, but 18 they will be doing a reg review.

19 And also, you may have heard earlier there's 20 legislation pending right now that's under consideration 21 where I would certainly encourage you to reach out to 22 your representative to express your concerns. And if you want, I will actually I'll have your contact information 23 24 and can provide you with some resources for folks that 25 could report on your concerns. Because the 338.040 CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1 Public Works doesn't have the authority to report on that at this time. 2 3 MR. COWLES: Okay. COUNSEL STEWART: But I hear you. 4 MR. COWLES: Thank you. 5 6 COUNSEL STEWART: Thank you. 7 CHAIRPERSON HAND: Any other comments from 8 the south? COUNSEL STEWART: All right. Well, thank 9 10 The State Public Works Division will put together a you. 11 report that will include a report on our workshop here and that there were a number of people in attendance that 12 didn't talk. You bribed them with doughnuts and 13 14 everything. So unless there are any other questions, that concludes the workshop. 15 16 VICE-CHAIR BENTLEY: If I may, Chairman Bentley. Before we close that item, I would strongly 17 18 recommend please, if you have any comments at all, please 19 state them because this is our best chance to get things 20 in here. If you can see places where we can make changes 21 to simplify and make the thing better, we need to do it It's extremely important. And I applaud you for 22 now. I'm behind you one hundred percent. 23 your comments. 24 Kevin. Thank you. 25 DIRECTOR ROBB: Mr. Chairman, Jack Robb, for CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1 the record. Like I said, I've participated in this process with multiple agencies. And the Governor is 2 shooting for simplification, which in a lot of people's 3 minds, that says more redline on the document than blue. 4 Blue is the new stuff. Red is the stuff that gets taken 5 6 out. And a lot of the agencies, it's 95 percent red, 7 five percent blue just to tie sentences together and 8 stuff.

9 One of my agency's hearings and appeals for 10 workman's comp has more blue than red. There are some 11 times that additional is simplification not just 12 subtraction. So keep that in mind also that if there's 13 things that we need to add that will make a process more 14 streamlined or efficient, cost effective or give us a 15 better product, we want to know about that too.

I think a lot of people thought of simplification in terms of the Executive Order is find ten regulations to make it go away or change substantially to make the process easier or get rid of antiquated things that don't apply anymore. But if we need to add stuff, we need to keep that in mind too.

22 CHAIRPERSON HAND: So, Susan, Chairperson
23 Hand, for the record. So beyond today, there's simply a
24 report. But is there a process? We have public comment
25 at every meeting and so forth and so there's still a
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window that's open and an opportunity in the future. I'm asking the question because I want to make sure that that's possible. It may not be directly associated with the order, but folks can make public comment at any time, right?

6 DIRECTOR ROBB: Jack Robb, for the record. 7 Coming from the Department of Wildlife and Clint's been 8 involved with -- Commissioner Bentley has been involved 9 in it a long time, the regulation process, currently, 10 we're in temporary reg process. So even if we were 11 trying to do something, it would be a temporary reg. 12 That expires in November.

When the legislature is in session, you 13 cannot change a reg on a permanent status. So if we 14 wanted to change it, if we sent this report to the 15 16 Governor's Office and he says yes, I like -- the Governor's staff says this is what we want to go forward 17 18 with, then we have to send official language to LCB to 19 have them put it into official LCB language. You send your intent. A lot of times, it comes back different. 20 21 You've got to go back and forth a couple times because they speak a different language than most people. 22 So 23 after you get through that process -- I'm just being serious here, but it's the truth. 24

> COUNSEL STEWART: I think we're chuckling CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

But once you get through the 2 DIRECTOR ROBB: back and forth with staff and LCB staff, then we would 3 have to agendize it and have a workshop. And it's 4 5 against the rules to workshop and adopt in one time, so 6 then there would be another hearing to adopt. So there would be multiple publication periods, multiple meetings 7 8 about it and a formal adoption. And once that formal adoption happens by the 9 10 board, then it goes to LCB or it goes back to LCB, gets

put on a calendar and goes in front of ledge commission. And if people don't like what the board has done, they can go complain to ledge commission. And it doesn't become law until ledge commission says yes, it's passed. So even if we started today, a year, a year and a half down the road is what we've talked about today.

COUNSEL STEWART: Yeah. Susan Stewart, for the record. And to add onto what the director has said, the staff will be coming to the Board for adoption of the 20 2024 Building Code. And so as some of the board members may remember, that's just as the director described, that's the entire reg process.

Administrator Lefevre mentioned earlier we're
looking at our green building standards, and perhaps
those need to be updated as they may be antiquated. So
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that process will be happening. And certainly, what's
 been discussed here as well as what else makes sense for
 the Division will all be considered.

For those of you that have been on the board 4 5 for some time, you may recall several years ago we developed regulations for the CMAR subcontractor 6 selection process and that involved many, many, many 7 8 meetings. And so I hope when I say this that others The State Public Works Division has a good 9 agree. 10 reputation and a good practice of working with our 11 stakeholders, and that would certainly be the process 12 going forward as far as any new regs were developed. MR. MAURER: Seth Maurer: S-E-T-H 13 M-A-U-R-E-R with CORE, all caps. Our marketing 14 department wouldn't like it to be in all caps. 15 16 I do support that, Ms. Stewart, because a lot of other public agencies ask what is the State doing. 17 18 How are they doing it. I think this is a really good

19 problem to have in terms of a few questions. We're here for support. We think that the State has a high level of 20 21 accountability and transparency in terms of competition. We hard bid plenty of projects for the State. 22 We've served the State for 25 years now, I believe. 23 But the delivery methods and the processes that you put out in 24 25 our construction industry are very fair, and I think a CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1 lot of other public agencies look to duplicate your 2 processes. 3 COUNSEL STEWART: Thank you. I don't have anything else. 4 So with that --5 CHAIRPERSON HAND: 6 Chairperson Hand, for the record. With that, I think 7 it's great that you all were here today in the north and 8 in the south. We appreciate your participation. And thank you for taking the time to review the regs, provide 9 10 comments if you participated in the survey and be here 11 today. 12 And with that, we'll move onto Item 7 on the agenda, which is discussion only which is board comment 13 14 and discussion. And, Kent, are you going to take that? COUNSEL STEWART: This is Susan Stewart, for 15 16 the record. So just a couple of items. We, the State Public Works Division, in my 16 years with the Division, 17 has not had a board meeting ever during the session. 18 So there are several items from the December meeting that 19 staff has made a note of and we will be following up with 20 21 the Board and reporting back when we get together after 22 the session. As you may recall, typically, at the 23 conclusion of the session, we'll schedule a Board 24 25 meeting, we'll report on the session, impact that that CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

may have on the Public Works Division's program. Also,
 we'll be talking about, as I mentioned, adopting the
 building code for 2024, what that process is going to
 look like.

Also, as we reported in December, we are 5 6 doing some energy efficiency studies on a couple of test 7 projects that we'll be reporting back. Member Kevin 8 Lewis and I had a follow-up discussion, and he graciously gave me until the next board meeting to follow up on some 9 10 loose ends I'm going to tie up. And then also, we have a 11 discussion to follow up on the window replacements and 12 our coordination with other state agencies on that issue. So that's what I have on my list for our next meeting. 13 And I just didn't want the Board to think that I hadn't 14 made a note of that and we wouldn't be following up. 15 We 16 just were not going to do it today. Sorry.

17 CHAIRPERSON HAND: Is there I guess does 18 anybody have any questions for Susan based on what she 19 just shared? I'm glad to hear that we're going to follow 20 up.

21 COUNSEL STEWART: Yes. No questions?
22 CHAIRPERSON HAND: Okay. I just have one.
23 And this is -- I looked at the org chart this morning
24 just to catch up because there have been a lot of
25 changes, and there are still quite a few vacancies in CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1 there. And I'm curious sort of how that is impacting
2 Public Works today. I think there were like ten
3 inspector vacancies and a couple of PM vacancies. Could
4 you maybe comment on that?

ADMINISTRATOR LEFEVRE: Sure. Kent Lefevre, 5 6 for the record. We have actually made quite a bit of 7 progress with filling in vacancies over the past year, 8 year and a half to the point that we've on-boarded some new staff including one new mechanical engineer since we 9 last met and we made an offer to an architect candidate. 10 11 Hopefully he'll accept and we'll have another candidate, 12 another architect in the south.

So as far as the inspector vacancies, that 13 still remains a challenge for us, but we've gone from 11 14 vacancies in professional services down to, I think, 15 16 we've got two or three. So we have made quite a bit of stride in that area. We're excited about that. We also 17 18 asked the Legislature for four new project managers and 19 one program officer. So that's still floating around out 20 there, but we'll see if that's approved. But the other 21 thing I want I to tell the Board is that vacancies are lower now than they were before COVID. So that's a good 22 step in the right direction. 23

 DIRECTOR ROBB: If I may add to what
 Mr. Lefevre brought up, I have a report that I got this CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

1 morning. The State has a vacancy rate of 24.03 as of 2 April 1st. That is one of the Governor's priorities and 3 that's one of his executive orders is it's put on one of 4 my agencies to figure out how to streamline the hiring 5 process.

And in one of the Governor's big bills SB 6 431, there's a total rewrite as to how we hire people. 7 8 NRS 284 has changed top to bottom to make it easier for State agencies to hire and for directors like Kent or 9 administrators like Kent to be able to make decisions 10 11 without having to go through HR and get watered-down lists, it will be his list to deal with in the future 12 which we are hoping has some impacts. 13

Also, the Governor is looking at some substantial pay increases trying to get us back into -and we're not going to be up to market with the pay increases, but it's going to be more attractive than it currently is. So it's not just this division. It's every division. And it's recognized, and a lot of things are in the works to make that better.

21 CHAIRPERSON HAND: Thank you for the insight. 22 The compensation was really good to hear that it's, you 23 know, that there's some effort there. It obviously is a, 24 you know, an issue for the State. So I'm glad to hear 25 that. Thank you for the information. CAPITOL REPORTERS (775) 882-5322

Any other questions or how about from down 1 If not, then we'll go to the next item on our 2 south? agenda which is public comment. 3 Do we have any public comment down south? 4 5 Okay. Do we have any here? 6 COUNSEL STEWART: Seeing none. 7 CHAIRPERSON HAND: Okay. Hearing none, the 8 next item on our agenda is to adjourn. I had anticipated that this would be a much longer meeting with a workshop 9 10 and was pleasantly surprised. Again, obviously, you're 11 all doing a good job at the workshop with so few 12 comments, so thank you all for being here today. 13 Welcome, Phillip. Thank you all that joined us today for 14 being here and with that, I'll ask for a motion to adjourn. 15 16 MEMBER MANNELLY: So moved. MEMBER TIBERTI: Tito Tiberti. 17 So moved. 18 VICE-CHAIR BENTLEY: Second. 19 CHAIRPERSON HAND: Any discussion? All in 20 favor, say aye. 21 THE BOARD: Aye. Abstain?
